A Visit to a RALA Festival Launched Dave Tundo's Metalsmithing Journey

ave Tundo's journey to becoming a Roycroft Master Artisan in metalsmithing began at a RALA show more than a decade ago.

"After my kids grew up, I went to a RALA show and saw Frank Glappa's booth," Tundo says, "and he invited me to take one of his classes."

That led to additional learning opportunities with other metalsmiths, including Robert Trout and Al Sleeper. "Then essentially I had a two-year apprenticeship with Ron VanOstrand."

Tundo's interest in art can be traced to a young age. "Art class was probably my favorite class," he says. "But in high school, the guidance counselor always filled my schedule with advanced math and science classes, so there wasn't any room in my schedule to explore an art class."

Teaching technology and engineering at Orchard Park Central Schools for 36 years provided a creative outlet for Tundo. "Making rockets and robots," he says.

However, he didn't discover his artistic outlet until bout nine years before his retirement from the school district in 2018, and he never imagined it would become a passion. "If anything, I probably would have gone into woodworking," Tundo says.

In fact, Tundo admits that before that



fateful RALA show at which he met Frank Glappa, he had never even heard of metalsmithing, an ancient artform that has utilized the same techniques for thousands of years.

Mastering the craft took time.

After taking a few classes, "I thought I would just fill up my house with the stuff I made," Tundo jokes. But, he says, he received a confidence boost when the Copper Shop Gallery agreed to sell his pieces, crafted in the basement studio he created in his home.

He was accepted as a Roycroft Artisan in 2009, but taking the next step, becoming a Master Artisan,

required a little more patience. The jury declined his application the first time around.

"I was rather disappointed," Tundo says. But he took a step back and spent the next five years honing his craft. And it paid off. He was elevated to Master Artisan in 2019.

Tundo creates household items and jewelry using copper and sterling silver. He finds the long and often tedious process of chasing and repousse therapeutic.

"And when the piece is finally done, it's gratifying to have something you've made with your own hands," Tundo says.

With shows cancelled, Tundo spent the Covid-19 lockdown working on commissions, including the often requested copper house numbers. "That and golf have kept me busy," he says.

But after the yearlong hiatus, Tundo is looking forward to the upcoming RALA Summer Festival, June 26-27, at the Classic Rink, because he enjoys interacting with the public. "I hope people have the opportunity to finally get out and come to the show," he says.

The support of the Roycroftersat-Large Association has been an invaluable resource for the artisan. "There is definitely a valuable camaraderie," he says, citing the geographic diversity of the membership. "Out West, down South and local, as well."

Tundo served on the RALA board, he says, "because I wanted to give back to the organization that gave me this new career."

He credits the success of his artistic career to the willingness of experienced artisans to serve as mentors. "They didn't have to share their talents," Tundo says. "They could have kept it to themselves." \P
