

Art comes to life when Karen Matchette's pen hits paper

OK, I'll admit it. When it comes to collecting antiques, artwork and memorabilia, I'm a bit of a geek. Maybe not as bad as the guys on TV's hit show "The Big Bang Theory," who love to collect comic books and items linked to Star Trek and Star Wars, but pretty close.

But that's probably why I was so shocked and excited when, while doing online research on Roycroft Artisan Karen Matchette, I came across several references to her work on projects such as "Dennis the Menace" and "The Flintstones." As it turns out, this new pen & ink Roycroft Artisan, who specializes in house drawings, is also pretty well known to comic book enthusiasts.

The following is taken from a recent email conversation with Karen, who is now settled in Buffalo, N.Y., just a short drive from the Roycroft Campus.

Where did you receive your training as an artist? Was there formal training, or is it something that naturally developed on its own?

"I was raised in Buffalo and was always interested in art. My parents were encouraging and in my early teens I attended art classes offered in the basement of the Albright-Knox Art Gallery. Later, I received my degree at Buffalo State studying graphic design."



The Internet claims that you're pretty well known in comic book circles, having worked as an illustrator for DC Comics at one point. What's most memorable about that time of your life?

"My real education happened in Carmel, California, where I landed my dream job as an apprentice to Hank Ketcham, the creator of "Dennis the Menace." I worked for Hank for 13 years learning the art of cartooning, and what a master he was ... a true artist extraordinaire!

"What was memorable was the complete education I received from Hank as well as meeting a whole community of wonderfully talented cartoonists and artists. Being able to play all the great Pebble Beach golf courses and live in such a magnificent place was inspiring.

It is also where I met my husband who was also encouraging and inspiring but unfortunately passed away six years ago.

"I started working for Hank as a comic book artist and then graduated to the Sunday pages. From pencil to finished color, I learned the ins and outs of the 'funny business.' After that I took on 'The Flintstones' strip for a syndicate that distributed overseas. This was a great opportunity as well and expanded my repertoire to include writing the script as well as executing the daily strip and Sunday pages.

The "Goodie Box" - The bowl is made from Norfolk Pine, it was turned on a lathe and sanded. The finishing process brings out the color and translucence of the wood and is polished to a high gloss. The Goodie top is made of heavy gauge copper using the techniques of chasing and repousse, similar to how the Statue of Liberty was created. The lid is a subtle tribute to Kitty Turgeon featuring the motto Head, Heart and Hand. It also has a prominent "Double R" trademark for our organization, founded by Kitty and others to support artists and the continuation and evolution of the arts and crafts movement.



"I did various comic book work for them, sometimes doing the pencil layouts and inking them and other times doing just the pencil sketches."

Today you specialize in pen & ink drawings of homes. How did that happen?

"Also at that time I was starting up my own business drawing houses which was starting to catch on. So when DC Com-

ics moved all of their comic book operations out to LA and stopped using freelancers like me, I immersed myself in my pen & ink house portrait business. I still do some cartoon work and other art projects that I'm asked to do, but mostly my business is the pen & ink house drawings."



You're new to the Roycrofters-At-Large Association. What drove you to apply for Artisan designation?

"When I met Susan Lichtenthal and saw her work as well as some the other Roycroft Artisans, I was very impressed with the quality of the art and wanted to be a member. I had been part of the National Cartoonists Society for years but since wearing more of an artist's hat for the past 10 years, I feel honored now to be a Roycroft Artisan. I look forward to continuing my artistic career and being surrounded by the talented artists of the Roycrofters-At-Large Association."
